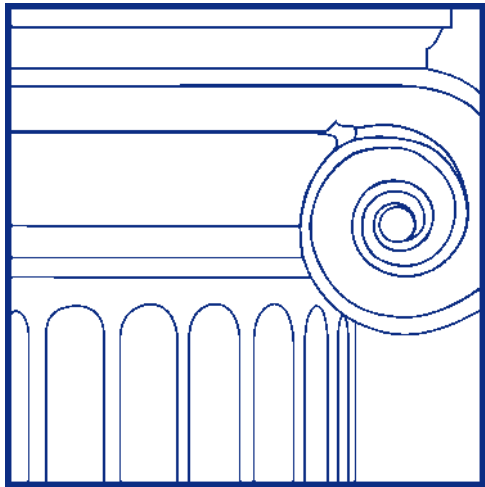

A Few Highlights from 2006 to 2008:

- Made more than 1400 grants to 261 charitable organizations, totaling \$11.1 million.
- Received more than \$19.5 million in gifts to new and existing funds.
- Helped individuals, families, businesses and organizations create 52 new funds to support their charitable interests. CFCG now has more than 200 funds to support the Central Georgia Community.
- Presented more than 400 local attorneys, CPAs, and other professional advisors the services offered by CFCG.
- Premiered the major motion picture, "The Ultimate Gift," witnessing the incredible journey of a young man learning the gifts of work, giving, love, and what is truly important in life.
- Through the Lillian T. Cartledge Foundation Fund, helped establish Middle Georgia HEARS, offering hearing impaired children throughout Central Georgia exceptional auditory-verbal therapy, so they may learn to listen and speak without limitations in mainstream society.
- Participated in the May 11, 2008 tornado recovery efforts by helping to establish the Central Georgia Tornado Recovery Fund and by administering a \$50,000 grant from W. W. Grainger, Inc. to benefit 12 local small businesses that sustained damage as a result of the storm.
- In an effort spearheaded by Macon City Councilwoman Nancy White and Councilman Larry Schlesinger, the Central Georgia C.A.R.E.S. Fund was established at the Community Foundation, with the purpose of improving the control and care of Macon and Bibb County's stray animal population.
- The Macon Fund for Excellence in Government and the Strategic Communication Fund were established to revitalize city government by providing Macon's new mayor wide-ranging funds, modeled after the successful efforts of Atlanta Mayor Shirley Franklin, which restored a businesslike approach to city government and reestablished trust among citizens.

The Community Foundation of Central Georgia was founded in 1993 by a group of citizens interested in encouraging philanthropy and strengthening communities. Since then, the Foundation has awarded more than \$30 million in grants through its donor advised, unrestricted, designated, field-of-interest, scholarship, and organizational endowment funds. As a local center for philanthropy, the Community Foundation of Central Georgia works with individuals, families, corporations, private foundations, and non-profit organizations to carry out their charitable objectives and address emerging community issues. It is one of more than 700 community foundations in the country.

It is our mission to enhance the quality of life for the people of Central Georgia. To accomplish its mission, the Community Foundation has five primary goals:

- To be a catalyst for the establishment of endowments to benefit the community now and for all time.
- To provide leadership and resources in identifying and meeting local needs.
- To serve donors' varied interests and needs.
- To promote local philanthropy.
- To serve as stewards of funds.

We help our donors establish long-term charitable funds, using the most tax-advantaged methods, to benefit their causes and our community.

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Give Now

If you want to establish a fund now and see your charitable dollars at work, creating a fund provides the satisfaction of giving while simplifying transactions and record-keeping. You can use your fund to support charities here in Central Georgia or anywhere in the country.

Donor Advised Funds

Donor advised funds offer a high level of involvement and flexibility while freeing the donor from the administrative time and expense associated with creating and running a private foundation. Donors have the privilege of recommending grants at any time to charitable organizations that match their interests. The Community Foundation staff shares information on local non-profit organizations and community projects the donor might find of interest. Donor advised funds allow the donor to involve children and family members and name unlimited successor advisors. The Community Foundation strives to tailor each fund to its donors' specific needs and interests.

Scholarship Funds

Scholarship funds allow donors to invest in the future by helping deserving students pursue higher education. Students benefit from the financial assistance as well as the academic recognition of being a scholarship recipient. The Community Foundation will work with each donor to establish selection criteria, scholarship guidelines, an application process, procedures for awarding the scholarship, and selection committee members. Scholarship funds can benefit students at a particular school, within a specific field of study, or in a specific geographic area.

Designated Funds

Designated funds are established when a donor wishes to concentrate their philanthropic interest on one or more of their favorite charitable organizations. This allows funds to be available over time to help sustain the organization or to supplement specific projects.

Give Later

We will work with you and your professional advisor to create estate planning strategies that will preserve your charitable wishes long beyond your lifetime. Through a variety of deferred options, you and your loved ones can enjoy financial security and provide resources for community needs to serve generations to come.

Bequests

Donors can specify a gift in their will or revocable trust. All assets are retained during life and the donor's estate may receive a tax deduction for the bequest. The gift is made upon death, which creates a permanent endowment fund at the Community Foundation.

Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRT) and Charitable Lead Trusts (CLT)

CRTs are created and a fund at the Community Foundation is named as the beneficiary. An immediate tax deduction is received and the donor receives income for life or for a specified number of years. CLTs provide income to a fund at the Community Foundation for a period of years then direct the remaining—often appreciated—assets back to the donor's beneficiary. CLTs allow the passing of assets on to children and grandchildren while minimizing gift and estate tax liability.

Field of Interest Funds

Designated an interest area for your gift such as the arts, environment, or to benefit a specific county or community in Central Georgia. You can participate in grant making with our staff who will help identify organizations performing the most effective work in the field you specify.

Services

The Community Foundation offers a wide variety of services to simplify and enhance both a donor's annual and permanent giving. We are proud to offer the following services to CFCG fund holders and their families.

Flexibility

- A wide variety of assets are accepted, including cash, stock, mutual funds, retirement assets and IRA's, real estate, LLP/LLC shares, insurance policies, CRTs and CLTs, private foundation assets, and tangible personal property.
- Use your fund to complete your annual giving—make one gift and let us handle the details of sending out multiple grant checks to your favorite organizations.
- Make periodic gifts during life and/or defer your gift by naming your fund as the beneficiary of a retirement account or making a specific bequest in your will.

Value

- Personal attention, proactive ideas, and a quick response to your needs.
- Full income, gift, and estate tax benefits allowed by law.
- Permanent record of your charitable interests, philanthropic endeavors, family legacy, and giving philosophy.
- Historical analysis of your grantmaking available at the end of every calendar year to assist in your philanthropic planning.
- Assistance with developing grant criteria, designing an application and managing the process from start to finish for a competitive grantmaking program from your donor advised fund if desired.
- High-quality investment and financial management.

Ease

- All administrative tasks handled by the Foundation staff, including issuance of checks, management of complex contributions, important reminders and updates, grant progress reports, record of all transaction, and regular contact with professional advisors.
- Make a gift now, and decide on grant recipients when you are ready.
- E-mail, fax, or mail grant recommendations.
- Confirmation of all gifts received and grants made.

Education

- Shared knowledge of community organizations, grant applications, and local needs, including the *Partners in Philanthropy* grant newsletter.
- Specialized, anonymous research on a specific organization or interest area.
- Organization and facilitation of family meetings to discuss philanthropic interests, grantmaking opportunities, and family goals, to involve children and grandchildren, and to plan for the succession of future fund advisors.
- Periodic site visits to local non-profit organizations.
- If desired, obtain end-of-grant reports from the charities you support to determine whether the outcomes that you expected when you made your grants have occurred.
- Access to the National Center for Family Philanthropy teleconference series and Family Philanthropy Online Knowledge Center, to find tools for creating your family's legacy and passing along your values to your children, and to search informative articles, case studies, profiles, and reports about family philanthropy.

"After our mother died in 2005, we wanted to honor her in some way, but we didn't know exactly what to do," said Nancy Nations Davis, daughter of the late John and Nancy Nations. "One of my brothers learned of the Community Foundation, and it just felt right." Mrs. Davis, her two brothers, and their 10 children serve as advisors and have already made two grants from the Fund—to family churches. "We're excited that we can choose the recipients each time," Mrs. Davis said. "And

someday the great-grandchildren will be involved. We're a close-knit family, so we like that. Our parents gave us such a legacy of giving, and we think we found the right way to give back."

The Clifton/Whitehead Scholarship Fund

Scholarship Fund

The late Edward Whitehead was a kind man, despite a lonely life of severe physical disabilities. Frugal and wise, he invested an inheritance and told friends Horace and Gloria McSwain he wished to reward deserving students through college scholarships. "Horace drew up the Truman-Clifton Trust...Edward Whitehead did not want it named for himself," said Gloria McSwain, a former trustee. The original trust, and now the Scholarship Fund, awards 12 scholarships each year, and recipients who maintain good grades continue receiving funds for four years. For years Mrs. McSwain handled the pile of paperwork, including marketing brochures, letters, and checks to the colleges each semester. In 2005 fellow trustee Albert Reichert suggested easing that burden by placing the Scholarship with the Community Foundation. "Now all I do is go to a meeting once a year," Mrs. McSwain said. "The Community Foundation handles all the rest, and they're so nice to work with."

Designated Fund

The late Marianne L. Pattan, PhD, passed away in 2004 and bequeathed \$50,000 to the Community Foundation to benefit the Friends of the Middle Georgia Regional Library. The Macon psychologist designated the funds to benefit the Summer Reading Program, which reaches 3,000 children each year. "My wife was an avid reader," said Dr. Pattan's husband, Dr. John Pattan. "She found great solace in reading widely in both professional literature and fiction. Her bequest was to help others also become avid readers." Friends' President Cathy Ivey said such bequests are gratefully received by her organization, and it is a plus to have the corpus so skillfully managed by the Community Foundation. Joanne Hinman, the library's Director of Children's Services, has many exciting ideas for the Reading Program, and Mrs. Ivey said, "this endowment helps her program immensely."

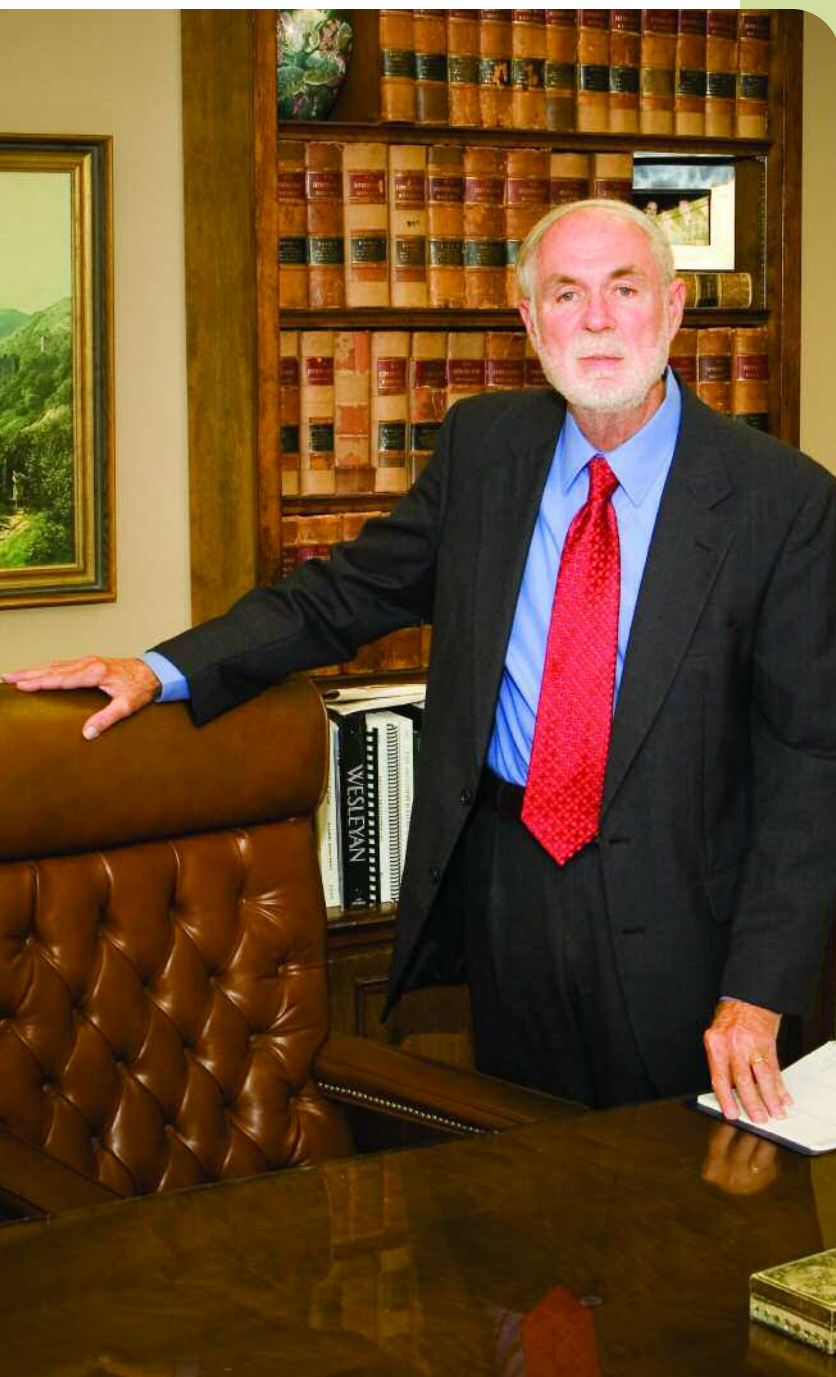

Wise Counsel

When a client of attorney Thomas L. Bass wanted her estate to benefit the Macon community as well as family members, Bass knew the best way to fulfill both those wishes. “We set up a foundation when we made the will,” said Bass, senior partner in the firm of Anderson, Walker & Reichert. The will named the Community Foundation of Central Georgia as trustee and recipient of half of the estate’s funds. “With a fund of moderate size, there’s an advantage in going in with others with the same goals: a little bit of money can go a long way,” Mr. Bass said. “The Community Foundation partners with the client and the attorney to accomplish the goals the client wants. The economy of doing it that way is very, very good. And the staff at the Community Foundation made it easy. We all are on the same team...with the goal of maximizing the assets to do good in the community.”

While half of the estate’s funds went to the Community Foundation, proceeds from the other half go to several life tenants. Upon their deaths those funds will revert to the Community Foundation. “This client was supportive of the cultural, spiritual, and educational life of the community, and the will sets out her interests, listing by name several organizations, with the Community Foundation as trustee,” said Mr. Bass. “I think it was very satisfying to her to know that her assets will continue as she wished in perpetuity.”

Bass and his wife, Tricia, a CFCG Board Member, are also longtime friends of the Community Foundation and attend its functions regularly. Bass said he finds the tours the Foundation offers in various parts of the community very informative. “I want to be informed when working with other clients who want to do something like this client did,” he said. “The tours help me understand what the needs are.”

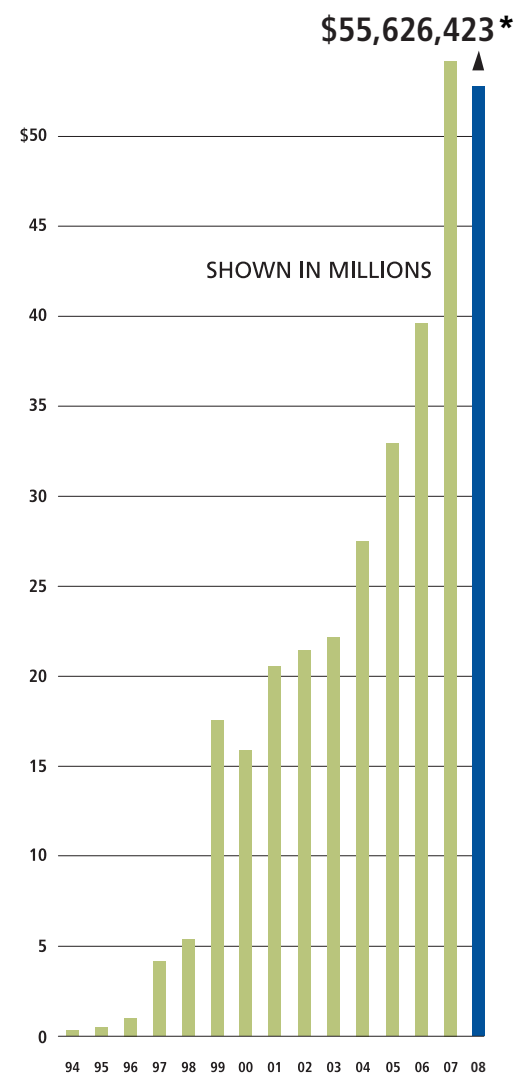

Organizational Endowment Funds

NewTown Macon

Organizational Endowment Funds

The partnership forged in 1996 between the Community Foundation and NewTown Macon continues to be strong, with a profound impact on the city's progress. Visible benefits from that partnership include the Ocmulgee Heritage Trail and Charles H. Jones Gateway Park with its statue of Otis Redding. NewTown has been able to purchase strategic downtown properties and to purchase, upgrade, and re-sell declining downtown properties. Now we have 55 historic markers on notable structures and a walking tour to bring that history to life. NewTown maintains five funds with the Community Foundation and is in its second capital campaign with a goal of \$21 million. "The Community Foundation gives us credibility, providing assurance for our donors that their money will be well managed," said Laura Schofield, NewTown's Vice President for Resource Development. "It is a great partnership and an exciting time for downtown Macon."

Junior League of Macon Organizational Endowment Fund

In 2005, the Junior League of Macon established an organizational endowment fund with the Community Foundation of Central Georgia to support the Junior League's various charitable and educational projects. Including a combination of gifts and challenge grants—one \$5,000 challenge grant came from the Community Foundation itself—the Fund has grown to more than \$62,000. "The money is there to finance, sustain, and possibly initiate designated Junior League community projects," said Mary Bennet Dunwody Rose, 2007-2008 League President. Operating the Fund in partnership with the Community Foundation is "a win-win for everybody," Ms. Rose said. "It gives us credibility. Our sustainers can have assurance that the Fund is under prudent management," she said. "And the staff at the Community Foundation is a great team to work with."



Benefits

Many different types of assets are accepted, including complex contributions that your organization might not have the capability to handle. Examples include real estate, LLP and LLC shares, retirement assets, and life insurance policies.

CFCG's Finance Committee monitors the work of the investment managers, freeing time for your Board to focus on planning and development.

Separating your endowment from other assets ensures resources will be available to meet future organizational needs.

CFCG pools its long-term funds, allowing for less expensive access to high quality and diversified investment management.

Partnering with CFCG, which has been recognized for having organizational and financial practices that are in accordance with the National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations, offers credibility and confidence for your organization.

Services

All administrative and financial tasks are handled by the Foundation staff, including acceptance of contributions, recording of all transactions and mailings to your constituents. This frees time for your staff and volunteers to focus on other important tasks.

Support in developing a planned giving program, including customized brochure, planned giving resources, and publicity.

Annual mailing to CFCG donors, listing your organization as a CFCG partner.

If requested, an annual visit by CFCG's President to your organization's Board meeting to further explain the mission of the CFCG and answer any questions the Board may have.

Periodic roundtable meetings and educational seminars for you and your staff.

Endowments provide a perpetual source of operating funds for non-profit organizations.

Big Brothers Big Sister of the Heart of Georgia, Inc. Endowment Fund—Founded with a \$20,000 grant from the E. J. Grassmann Trust, this endowment fund will sustain and expand the Mentoring Children of Prisoners Program, which is a program of Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Heart of Georgia, Inc. In this program, adult mentors are matched with children who have at least one parent incarcerated in a state or federal facility. Research shows that, without a positive intervention such as mentoring in their lives, 70% of these children will end up in prison themselves. BBBS has been serving the youth of our area for fifty years, and thousands of young boys and girls have benefited from volunteer mentors in the community. Many of the volunteer matches last well beyond the one-year commitment and often result in life-long friendships.

Family Counseling Center Endowment Fund

Established in 1957 by the Junior League of Macon and the United Way of Central Georgia, FCC has licensed therapists trained in psychology, family therapy and social work. FCC offers marital and family therapy, victim counseling, programs for divorcing parents, adoption and custody evaluations, therapeutic educational programs and a juvenile court program designed to help parents deal with the unruly behavior of their children.

Federated Garden Clubs of Macon Endowment Fund

FGC Macon is located in the historic Neel Reid designed Joseph N. Neel house and has been for more than fifty years. FGC Macon is currently looking for partners with its 2009 Traveling Neel Reid Tour. The mission of FGC Macon is to coordinate the interests of the Garden Clubs of Macon and to bring them into closer relations of mutual helpfulness, to promote the love of gardening, to promote the study of horticulture, to encourage civic development and beautification, and to promote conservation and environmental protection. The house is open to the public for tours and special events, and is also used for Garden Club activities.

Friends of the Grand Fund—The Friends of the Grand Fund is an endowment that was established in 1985 by generous volunteers and supporters in an effort to secure the ongoing operation of Macon's historic treasure, The Grand Opera House. The Fund was moved to the Community Foundation in 2001 and is to benefit the maintenance and operational and capital improvement needs of The Grand.

Friends of the Library Milner, Inc. Endowment Fund

An endowment fund of the Barnesville-Lamar Community Foundation, the Friends of the Library Milner, Inc. Endowment Fund was established in December 2007 to support operation of a Milner Public Library.

Georgia Industrial Children's Home Fund—For many years the Home's Farm provided eggs, meat, and produce to homes and merchants throughout Central Georgia, as well as a place for thousands of children to call "home." More than one hundred years later, that Home is still dedicated to serving abused, abandoned, and neglected children and adolescents. The problems children face have become more complicated, but Rev. Mumford's vision is evolving to meet those challenges. The Home today provides a safe and nurturing environment for children with no other place to go, while giving them the opportunities to learn skills that allow them to become productive Georgia citizens. The Home works on three different levels: Therapeutic Foster Care, Long Term Residential Treatment, and Immediate Care for children in crisis. Staff members work to develop children spiritually, emotionally, physically and educationally and also strive to create a homelike atmosphere for children who have suffered from serious abuse and who are emotionally disturbed.

Girl Scouts Endowment Fund—The Girl Scouts of Historic Georgia's mission is "to build girls of courage, confidence and character, who make the world a better place". Girl Scouting offers young girls a variety of activities to choose from, including leadership development, summer camps, arts & crafts, outdoor adventures, marketing/financial experience and friendship building.

The Grand Opera House Endowment Fund

The Grand, a performing arts center of Mercer University, is a historic 1,000-seat theatre located in downtown Macon. Built in 1884, The Grand is owned by Bibb County, but has been leased to Mercer University since 1995. The Grand brings the very best in live, professional performing arts and entertainment to Central Georgia. In addition to its popular Broadway Series of nationally-touring productions and its GrandKids Arts Education Series for elementary, middle and high school students, The Grand hosts a variety of special events throughout the year. It is also home to the Macon Symphony Orchestra, the Central Georgia Opera Guild and The Nutcracker of Middle Georgia.

Historic Rose Hill Cemetery Foundation Fund—

Located on the banks of the Ocmulgee River, Historic Rose Hill Cemetery is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. One of the oldest surviving cemetery parks in the U.S., Rose Hill houses a variety of monuments, including the family of Sidney Lanier, a confederate cemetery, members of The Allman Brothers Band and many more. The Foundation was created in order to fund the up-keep of this 164-year old landmark. The Endowment Fund will help preserve one of Macon's great treasures.

Lamar County Schools System Endowment Fund—

The mission of the Lamar County Schools System is to work with the family and community to provide quality educational opportunities that inspire all learners to reach their potential. The Lamar County Schools System Endowment Fund will sustain and enhance the quality of education in the LCSS and provide assistance to the public school system including grants for classroom teachers, recognition and special events, and student support.

Museum of Arts and Sciences Endowment Fund—

In the 52 years since its founding by community leaders and volunteers, MAS has served as an educational and cultural resource for Central Georgia. It is a multi-disciplinary institution with a broad mission to interpret and exhibit objects of artistic, scientific and cultural value, and to organize related programming. Located on 18 acres of land in a facility of more than 48,000 square feet, the Museum offers 12–15 changing exhibitions a year, specialized tours for more than 15,000 school visitors, outreach programs, lectures, workshops, classes, daily planetarium shows and live animal programs, summer and holiday camps, and six Family Days annually. The Museum is a dynamic institution with programs designed to enhance community needs and address community interests.

Nutcracker of Middle Georgia Fund—

Founded in 1985, the Nutcracker's mission is to stage the finest possible annual production of the magical "Nutcracker" Ballet. Each year dozens of dedicated people invest their time, talents, and financial resources to make possible this annual treat. The talented dancers, fantastic sets, and outstanding costumes are the culmination of a year-long process of planning and preparation. The end result significantly enriches the cultural life of this region, while rewarding those who take part with new friendships, valuable experiences gained and fond memories of an exuberant and touching performance.

Ocmulgee Land Trust, Inc.—

The Ocmulgee Land Trust is a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving local property and handling conservation easements along the Ocmulgee River. The mission is to preserve land in the Ocmulgee River basin.

The Shield Club Fund—

The Shield Club was chartered in 1968 and is a service organization that offers financial assistance to firemen, policemen, and peace officers in cases of extreme hardship or to their families in the event of their death. The Shield Club also grants annual scholarships to officers and their children.

St. George's Episcopal School Endowment Fund—

Located in Milner, Georgia, St. George's Episcopal School provides each child with an opportunity for an excellent education through active learning and independent thinking. In a school environment grounded in religious values, students develop healthier relationships, enlarge their respect for cultural diversity, and share in community service. The endowment fund, established in April 2007 is a fund of the Barnesville-Lamar Community Foundation.

The United Way Endowment Fund—

Serving 14 counties in central Georgia, The United Way began in 1922 as the Community Chest of Bibb County. The first campaign raised more than \$60,000 to serve local non-profit agencies. By the end of the 1970's, the annual giving campaign had reached nearly \$1 Million. Following a merger of local United Way organizations in 1989, The United Way of Central Georgia was formed and amazing growth and support followed. In 2007, The United Way raised \$4.4 Million through its annual campaign and served more than 100,000 Central Georgians. Its mission is to mobilize the community to change lives and improve community conditions through agency programs that demonstrate measurable impact.

The **Community Foundation of Fort Valley** awarded a total of \$10,000 last year to two non-profit groups with specific needs. The awards will benefit adults, teens, and children.

"We're excited to see the Community Foundation of Fort Valley grow and get to this point," said Jim McClarnon, affiliate Board Chairman.

The Board awarded \$4,000 to the Boys and Girls Clubs of Georgia Heartlands for a new teen program. Two years ago, teen membership in the Clubs was stagnant, with only a few youth involved. "But now they have more than forty," McClarnon said.

The Foundation's second grant was \$6,000, awarded to the Peach Community Choir. The award will benefit the piano at the Austin Theatre, a newly restored Fort Valley theatre.

The CFFV functions as an affiliate of the Community Foundation of Central Georgia. "They're our parent.

And to be able to make a difference for everybody in Fort Valley is very exciting."

Assets of the **Community Foundation of Coffee County**, an affiliate of the Community Foundation of Central Georgia, have grown to more than \$3,000,000. The corpus of CFCC now includes donor advised funds, agency, unrestricted, and field-of-interest funds. "Building endowments to provide for the future of our community is as important to our quality of life as anything one might choose to do," said Robert L. Porter, Chairman of the CFCC Board of Directors. The continuing success of the Foundation underscores its stated mission of advancing philanthropy in the community and connecting people who care with causes that matter. An example of this commitment is the South Georgia Soccer Club Endowment Fund, established by the non-profit South Georgia Soccer Club, Inc. The Fund will promote fun, sportsmanship, physical fitness, and skills through soccer for children in Coffee and surrounding counties.

CFCC does not hold an annual fundraiser so as not to compete with local charities who do engage in annual fundraising events. “Instead, we’re looking for the person who wants to do something in a planned giving way,” Porter said. The professional management of its funds by the Community Foundation of Central Georgia has been excellent, Porter added, and the growth of the Coffee County affiliate has been enhanced by CFCG’s comprehensive support services. “We really appreciate the quality of their people,” Porter said. “They do the work for us; they’re our staff.”

The **Barnesville-Lamar Community Foundation** is the newest affiliate of the Community Foundation of Central Georgia, and the new kids on the block are off and running with an initial focus of educating the community on the benefits of an endowment.

“There are so many facets of it that it’s hard for people to understand what building an endowment is all about,” said Joe Edwards, CEO of United Bank Corp. and Board Chairman for the affiliate foundation.

The Board has discussed an initial \$5 million, five-year goal, “and I think we’ll go for that,” Edwards said. The Board also established Foundation Founders—supporters who will donate \$1,000 each to help spread the word. “And the Board of Directors will match the first \$100,000, and so we’ll have \$200,000,” Edwards said.

Community leaders in Barnesville had been watching the successes of several area community foundations and decided that the Community Foundation of Central Georgia was the one they wanted to partner with. “And it’s been a good story ever since,” Edwards said. “Kathryn Dennis is very professional and has a great staff. We’ll need them for years, for decades. And we would not be this far along had not Joe Timberlake, Juanita Jordan, and Kathryn come to town in December 2006 and made a pitch that inspired us. And so we’re on our way. We’re not a rich county, but we have a lot of loyal people, and we look for this to be a success.”

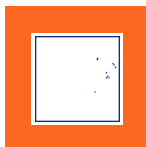
